# Kids Programs: A Decade of Disinvestment

2011 - - Local "Children & Families Commissions" Eliminated

2009 - 15 - - Budget Cuts to:

Homeless Youth
MH / BH Programs
Foster Care
Child Welfare

## By 2019:

- 67% <u>cut</u> in children's residential programs,
- √ 90% <u>cut</u> to homeless youth programs,
- √ 90%+ <u>cut</u> to substance abuse treatment for children.

#### Result:

- ✓ Oregon is now 46<sup>th</sup> in youth mental health
- ✓ 21,000+ homeless <u>adults</u> (who came from...)

## Math:

400+ aging out of services each year

9 years 
$$X 400 = 3,600$$

42.5% of UH are 25-44

Total UH Ages 25-44\* = 3,549

### **Legislative Action:**

2021 - - \$2.0 million invested

2022 - - \$4.5 million invested

2023 - - \$25.1 million (DHS + Housing)

2025 - - Governor = \$20.5 GRB

Recommended: \$154 million / biennium





- √ \$30 million = Support Existing Programs & Expand (as recommended by study)
- √ \$11 million = Crisis Emergency Sustainability (preserve existing capacity)
- ✓ \$13 million = Fill GAP SUD Treatment
- ✓ \$3.5 million = Fill GAP Youth BH Workforce In-House Training
- ✓ NET OVER GOV Request = \$34.7 million (1/40<sup>th</sup> amount spent on adult system)



#### What Do We Know?

2/3 of youth who are homeless for <u>as</u>
<u>little as</u> **3 months**go on to become homeless as adults.



The cost of one adult trapped in homelessness is

\$3.2-\$5 million

Data shows that for every \$5 million of investment, we can serve over 700 RHY youth, so....

If just 50% of those youth for a three-year period <u>avoided</u> homelessness as adults, the state could save \$3.2 billion over the next 20-30 years.

### Wrap Around Model:

85% Success Rate

### **Bottom Line:**

We cannot fix or end <u>adult</u> homelessness until we fix <u>youth</u> homelessness.
