I can sympathize with the perceived cruelty of the method, but that doesn't make think there is no place for it in wildlife management for others to do. This method is effective and efficient, and I can guarantee is far less cruel than the manner in which a mountain lion kills at least one deer a week. With 6-7,000 mountain lions in the state, consider the volume of impact this population has. I want there to be mountain lions on the landscape, but I also want there to be other species as well. Oregon is not a national park, and we must manage all species so that they can thrive along with us humans. Let's give wildlife managers more tools, allow more local level choice, and ensure that all wildlife populations thrive. Voters should have a say in wildlife management, but that's what our ODFW commission is for, molded by our elected representatives. I hope that us city dwellers don't close our eyes and ears to the realities of life in the rural and allow more nuance and choice where it impacts those folks most directly.
