Why do we care about taxes?

Within our tax system exists powerful anti poverty tools designed for low to moderate income families

Child Tax Credit + Earned Income Tax Credit + more!

Oregon consistently ranks <u>close to last</u> compared to other states in access to these tax credits

Is a result of **families not filing their taxes** - means Oregonians are **leaving millions** federal and state credits and refunds on the table that should be **stabilizing family households** and **stimulating the local economy**

Why are families not filing their taxes?

Significant barriers can be categorized in three ways:

1. Misinformation

- a. Taxes are stressful, misunderstood, and not taught
- b. Requires bringing together financial documents and navigating companies infrastructure
- c. Families often do not understand the difference between must file and should file
- d. Tax code changes every year causes confusion

2. Cost

- a. Paid preparers charge significant amounts limits ability to acquire refunds
- b. Paid software also reduces refunds
- c. Predatory refund practices
- d. Disproportionally affects low income households

3. Access

- a. Majority of methods of tax preparation is available in English only
- b. Immigrants, refugees, and general population not familiar with tax system and how to file
- c. Significant distrust and fear of tax system and predatory preparers

What is the solution?

Volunteer Tax Preparation with **VITA** (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance)!

- VITA is a program of IRS that partners with local 501c3s (like MFS) to provide no cost no tax preparation for low income communities
- MFS organizes and trains 18 VITA tax sites with over 300 volunteers and staffing
- Low income Oregonians can meet one on one and get the coaching needed to file return and file their tax return
- Interpretation readily accessible and available


Who are receiving these tax services?

- We target low to moderate income households and limited english proficient households
- Average annual income of clients is \$28,000
- Average household size is 2.86
- 1 in 3 served are limited english proficient
- Oldest taxpayer was 101. Youngest 13
- Largest demographic is hispanic / latino with significant diversity across ethnicities
- Over 20 different languages requested for interpretation
- 1 in 4 describe themselves as infrequent tax filers




Despite this growth we are not meeting the need


- Estimated that Oregon needs to complete 64,000 additional EITC eligible tax returns a year to achieve a 90% participation rate
- From January April MFS CASH
 Oregon received over 20,000 calls
 from clients. In same time period we assisted over 9,000 families
- VITA capacity is underdeveloped
- Clients travel from across the state to access our services

What would an expanded TIG budget mean for Oregon?

- MFS estimates we could serve 25,000 families annually resulting in estimated annual economic impact of 50 million dollars for those Oregonian families
- Would broaden our geographic reach across Oregon in ability to expand physical offices and increase staffing to help more individuals
- Would build economic resiliency of the state in households that need it most
