OFB strongly supports House Bill 2097 because it continues to strengthen partnerships between farmers and charitable organizations. House Bill 2097 ensures the continuation of the Crop Donation Tax Credit for an additional six years, extending this vital support to 2032.

Without the renewal of this tax credit, many farmers would face significant challenges in sustaining these donations, threatening the availability of local, healthy food for those in need.

This tax credit has been instrumental in encouraging farmers to donate crops to food pantries, regional food banks, shelters, and other charitable organizations, helping to combat food insecurity while reducing food waste. Many of our members rely on this tax credit and deeply value Oregon's recognition of their contributions to communities in need.

By extending the sunset on this tax credit, the legislature reinforces its commitment to agricultural producers who generously support charitable efforts.
