It is unjust that someone with his education, skills, and abilities must limit his earning potential in order to maintain basic care.

I urge you to consider removing the income and resource limits that restrict individuals like my uncle. Doing so would allow people with disabilities to pursue higher-paying jobs and career advancement without fear of losing critical benefits. This change would not only improve the quality of life for those affected, but it would also help them contribute more effectively to society and generate additional tax revenue.
