This bill needlessly and recklessly puts some of our most vulnerable citizens Private and personal data at risk. The laws currently are supposed to protect people from unreasonable collection of their data. Changing the verbiage in the law and forcing middle aged and seniors to surrender their identification to be scanned is a violation of their privacy and an unreasonable search of their information. The current method of ensuring companies comply with scanning laws is the honor system. This is not addressed in the law. There should be an option to opt out from having your information scanned such as the new Oregon privacy law states.

This may seem like a small issue, but this is how we lose our freedoms, not all at once but bit by bit. These laws as they stand were worded to protect us when common sense should already dictate the correct course. If my 92 year old father goes to the store to buy a wine to use in a sauce he makes every year, forgets his ID, he can be refused service solely because the stores policy is to scan everyone's ID regardless of age. As I have mentioned to some of the Representatives, this verbiage is in other Oregon statutes, websites and documents which do not seem addressed in this Bill which could cause conflict in the future.
