Expanding the Perinatal/Doula Workforce to Improve Black Maternal and Infant Health Outcomes

As the **Program Manager for Sacred Roots**, Portland's largest **culturally specific doula and lactation program**, I strongly support **SB 692**, which would expand access to culturally specific perinatal services and increase the number of culturally competent lactation providers and doulas in Oregon.

At Sacred Roots, we provide **comprehensive**, **community-based perinatal and lactation support** for Black families, a population that continues to face significant disparities in both maternal and infant health. **Our lactation program employs the largest number of Black lactation providers in Oregon**, with two **Pathway 3 students currently on track to sit for the IBCLC exam** in Fall 2025 and Spring 2026. When they pass, they will make up **two of only six Black lactation consultants in the entire state**.

This is critical because Black mothers face **some of the lowest breastfeeding rates and the highest barriers to lactation support** due to systemic racism, lack of culturally competent providers, and limited access to evidence-based lactation care. Nationally:

- 85% of Black mothers initiate breastfeeding, but by six months, that number drops to 58%, compared to 76% of white mothers.
- Black mothers are **2.5 times more likely to be offered formula in the hospital**, disrupting early breastfeeding success.
- Structural barriers—such as lack of paid maternity leave, inadequate postpartum support, and systemic bias in healthcare—often lead to shorter breastfeeding durations and lower exclusivity rates.

Sacred Roots is changing these outcomes by:

-Offering home-based lactation support—meeting moms where they are, breaking down access barriers.

- **Employing Black lactation providers**—ensuring parents receive care from professionals who **understand their lived experiences**.

-Integrating lactation support into doula care—helping birthing parents establish breastfeeding before, during, and after birth.

-Providing long-term postpartum support through our Mothers Promise Club, a one-year



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program that ensures mothers receive consistent lactation counseling, resources, and community support.

SB 692 would allow us to expand these efforts. By increasing funding for community-based perinatal programs, this bill would:

-Help diversify the lactation workforce by creating sustainable pathways for Black lactation professionals.

-Expand culturally specific perinatal services, reaching more families who are often left out of traditional maternal health systems.

-Improve breastfeeding rates and health outcomes for Black mothers and babies, leading to lower infant mortality and better long-term health.

We cannot afford to overlook the importance of culturally competent, community-rooted care. This bill is an opportunity to invest in Black maternal health, diversify the perinatal workforce, and break down systemic barriers that have historically excluded Black families from receiving the care they deserve.

I urge legislators to **support SB 692** and ensure that programs like Sacred Roots can continue to **build equity, change breastfeeding outcomes, and save Black lives.**
