Support of HB 2448

Good afternoon Chair Neron, Vice Chairs Dobson and McIntire, and Members of the Committee, I appreciate the opportunity to speak with you today in support of HB 2448.

For the record, My name is **Hayley Palmer**, and I am the mother of **Mila, my bright and beautiful 8-year-old daughter** who experiences significant disabilities stemming from a brain injury during birth. These include Cerebral Palsy, epilepsy, cortical visual impairment, global developmental delay, a feeding tube, and many other issues she lives with every day. I am here today not only as a parent but as someone who is **terrified** to send my child to public school.

I should not feel this way. No parent should.

Despite Mila being school-aged, I have yet to enroll her in public, in-person school because of the **countless horror stories I've heard from other parents in my community**—stories of children being **neglected**, **harmed or denied the services they desperately need** simply because the **resources are not there**. These fears are not irrational. **They are founded on the lived experiences** of families just like mine.

These stories are **not isolated incidents**—they are warnings. Warnings that the system is **failing children like Mila** and that sending her to school could mean putting her **in harm's way**.

When I tried to navigate the IEP process in a district, I walked away with the understanding that Mila would not be offered a nurse to assist her on the bus. Instead, the staff asked if the parents could handle transportation themselves. This is the reality of underfunded special education services—where critical supports are unavailable, or families are asked to fill in the gaps. That is not how an equitable public education system should function.

As parents, **our number one job is to protect our children**. But for those of us with children who **cannot defend themselves, cannot tell us when something is wrong, and cannot advocate for their safety**, this responsibility carries an even greater weight. We are forced to ask ourselves impossible questions:

- Will my child be safe at school?
- Will she get the care she needs?
- If something happens, will she even be able to tell me?

The fact that I have to ask these questions at all is unacceptable.

Mila deserves an education like every other child, but I fear that the school system is unprepared to meet her needs. I do not fear the teachers. I do not fear the staff. I fear the lack of funding that keeps them from doing their jobs effectively—how they want to. The lack of highly trained personnel, the lack of adequate resources, and the lack of necessary support are what keep parents like me up at night. **HB 2448 is a critical step toward fixing this.** This bill gives school districts the **resources** to provide the **intensive, individualized support students like Mila require**.

When I send my daughter to school, she will be **safe**, **supported**, **and allowed to learn and grow**. But that belief must be built on **action**, **not hope**. **This committee has the power to take that action**.

Please **vote YES on HB 2448** and move this bill forward. Parents like me should not have to choose between **education and safety**—our children deserve both.
