**RE: City of Beaverton Supports HB 3527 (Drinking Water & Sewer Ratepayer Assistance Fund)**

Dear Co-Chairs Helm and Owens and Members of the Committee:

The City of Beaverton appreciates the opportunity to share its support for HB 3527, which provides critical utility assistance to some of our most vulnerable residents. The bill establishes the Public Drinking Water and Sewer Ratepayer Assistance Fund and appropriates \$11 million in state money to assist low-income Oregonians with water and sewer bill payments.

The City of Beaverton provides water service to approximately 90% of its residents. Drinking water and sewer rate affordability has been a long-standing challenge for many households, a challenge made only more acute by the COVID-19 pandemic. In the months prior to the pandemic, citywide water bill delinquencies averaged a total of \$160,000; as of June 2022, total delinquencies jumped to \$650,000, a greater than 400 percent increase.

Recent local and federal investments have been successful in reducing delinquencies for Beaverton water customers. Since Fiscal Year (FY) 2020, the City of Beaverton has dedicated \$223,230 in city revenue and \$45,000 of its federal CARES Act allocation to customer assistance programs. In 2021, the State of Oregon received \$14 million in one-time federal funds for water and sewer rate assistance, which to-date has provided 280 Beaverton residents with \$155,534 in assistance via the Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWA).

Although these investments have reduced delinquencies for Beaverton residents, significant needs remain. As of December 2024, the city had 254 residential customers with delinquent balances over 60 days, totaling more than \$97,346 in unpaid bills. For the current fiscal year, from July 1, 2024, through Feb. 10, 2025, Beaverton has helped 243 customers with financial assistance totaling \$56,364. The funding for this financial assistance comes from the City of Beaverton utilities (water, sewer, storm). We encourage the Legislature to act this session to provide continued relief to low-income households that experience a disproportionately high utility and water burden.
