My name is Stephanie, and I am a licensed social worker in Oregon and Washington. I am writing to express my strong support for House Bill 2554, which would allow Oregon to join the Social Work Licensure Compact.

I live on the border between Oregon and Washington and see patients from both states at the rural primary care clinic I work at. As a result, I need to maintain licenses in both states. I am sometimes unable to see clients via telehealth depending on their insurance, given that I am still an associate in one state and independently licensed in the other. This adds unnecessary burden on patients and administrative staff, and creates extra work and costs more for me in terms of license renewals and upkeep. In a time when mental health needs are soaring, particularly in rural areas, eliminating barriers to care is paramount.

Like many of my colleagues, I have witnessed firsthand the growing demand for social work services in our state. Burnout is at an all-time high, and we simply do not have enough social workers to meet the needs of all Oregonians. By joining the compact, we can help address this crisis by making it easier for qualified professionals to work in Oregon, reducing barriers to licensure, and expanding the social work workforce.

This bill would also provide much-needed relief for existing social workers by

increasing our professional mobility. Many of us have family in other states or want the flexibility to work across state lines through telehealth. HB 2554 would streamline this process and ensure that Oregon remains a competitive and attractive place for social workers.

I strongly urge you to support this legislation so that Oregon can take a crucial step toward addressing our social work shortage and improving access to care. Thank you for your time and consideration.
