Dear Chair Gelser-Blouin, Vice Chair Linthicum, and members of the Senate Committee

Disability Rights Oregon (DRO) submits this testimony in support of Senate Bill 875 clarifying the rights of children while in foster care.

Disability Rights Oregon filed a class action lawsuit in 2019 due to our concerns regarding the rights of foster youth. SB 875 does two critical things:

- in section one and five, it makes clear that foster youth will have access to their current and future siblings unless a Court enteres an order that such contact be limited due to safety concerns. One of the greatest sources of grief and separation anxiety from foster youth, is the lack of contact with their siblings. SB 875 allows those relationships to continue when safe and appropriate.
- 2) in section three, expressly includes other legal rights youth currently have regarding to be free from inappropriate seclusion and restraint, confidential access to their attorney, freedom of religion, and to have their belongings move appropriately with them.

DRO supports SB 875 as it protects and promotes the rights of foster youth including maintainig their relationships with siblings.

DRO is committed to ensuring the civil rights of all people are protected and enforced. In recent years, DRO has settled <u>a class action</u> <u>lawsuit</u> regarding the Department of Human Services failure to provide appropriate services to foster youth with disabilities.
