The different types of discharges from the US military as reflected on the form DD214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty which documents a service member's military service.

Military personnel are held to a high level of performance and conduct. Those who uphold a high level of professionalism will have earned an Honorable Discharge with all the benefits that come with it, such as education, healthcare, financial loans and job assistance to name a few.

The type of discharge is not based on time in service, as HB2559 has suggested for "under honorable conditions". There is a reason the US military recognizes different types of discharge and the benefits, or lack of benefits, that come with each type. The military is about mission accomplishment. That takes professionalism and good conduct. The discharge type is a tool to help with upholding that high degree of performance of duty. Service members work hard to earn an Honorable discharge.
