According to the Oregon Center for Public Policy, construction ranks second statewide for wage theft claims relative to workforce size. Federal and state enforcement agencies consistently uncover cases where unscrupulous contractors deprive workers of rightful wages, overtime pay, and benefits. The Department of Labor has recovered nearly \$1 million from Oregon contractors on federally funded projects, while the Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) recently settled a \$193,000 wage theft case affecting 26 workers.

The problem has grown so severe that BOLI has been forced to limit its investigations due to budget constraints, declining to accept cases where workers earn more than \$53,000 annually. Meanwhile, taxpayers shoulder the burden of these unlawful labor practices, with nearly half of Oregon's construction workers' families relying on safety net programs at a cost of \$710 million per year. Further compounding the issue, fraudulent payroll practices and worker misclassification cost the state over \$112 million annually—funds that could otherwise support essential services like schools, roads, and public safety.
