Testimony in Opposition to House Bill 3644

Chair and Members of the Committee,

- ? **Supporting job training and reentry programs** to give individuals a chance at long-term stability.

These organizations often achieve **better outcomes** than government-run programs because they **focus on individual accountability, life skills, and true rehabilitation**. Oregon needs **true reform, not more of the same failed policies**. I urge you to **reject HB 3644** and instead pursue an approach that prioritizes **treatment, recovery, and community-based solutions** that will actually help people reintegrate into society.
