First, Oregonians are weary of attempts to divide them from their neighbors based on race, religion, sex, gender, or any other characteristic. Second, they are also oppressed by the ever-growing tax burden imposed on them by the Oregon legislature resulting in few practical solutions to the problems we face in Oregon. HB 2995 is an attempt to spend taxpayers' money on a fruitless quest to correct what neither time nor money can change.

Racism has been a human defect since the beginning of time. African-Americans are not the only ones who have experienced discrimination based on immutable characteristics. In creating a task force to study reparations for African-Americans, House Bill 2995 would take Oregon into a long venture that would lead inevitably to expensive legal challenges and appeals. The courts have already ruled that discrimination more than 20 years in the past is too long ago to merit special treatment today. The Supreme Court has ruled against remedies "that are ageless in their reach into the past, and timeless in their ability to affect the future." They have also ruled that race-based special treatment in a state cannot be based on discrimination in another state. After

the expenditure of obscene amounts of taxpayers' money, the Supreme Court is likely to rule that any modern reparations are unconstitutional.
