Without taking action that is ANTI-racist, the racism continues to loom over us. Getting rid of lash laws in our state is not enough to repair the harm that has been done to Black Oregonians. We must take responsibility to right historic and current wrongs. Reparations are a great way to do that. This study gives Oregon the understanding of what might make the most sense for our state. For these reasons and more I urge strong support of HB 2995.
