Dear Chair Golden, Vice- Chair Nash and Members of the Committee:

My name is Rachael Gorjestani, the owner of a food business based in San Francisco who gets many of our pantry and wholesale items through a number of Oregon based businesses.

I am writing in support of SB 887 to create an Organic Policy Specialist position at the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA).

In 2022, the legislature declared organic one of five "emerging sectors" in Oregon and appropriated funds for economic assessments of each sector. The assessment laid out several opportunities to build economic, agricultural, environmental, and community resilience through the organic sector. Oregon must continue to prioritize support for organic agriculture and there is a growing need for a policy specialist who understands the principles and practices of organic farming, production and market creation.

Our organization would greatly benefit from an Organic Policy Specialist at ODA because my company only purchases organic ingredients. Specifically for our own business, we currently purchase ingredients with a few Oregon based businesses and would like to see them flourish and grow.

And yet there are many other reasons why we support this — it's good for the economy, it's good for the people of Oregon, it's good for the environment, and it ensures a future in the ever-threatening dangers of climate change.
