Oregon needs to improve the energy efficiency of its housing stock. The State has a large number of often-confusing, federal, state, and utility incentives to help finance life-changing home upgrades.

I think every Oregonian should have access to these upgrades and that we should make it easier for people from all parts of the state and all income groups to make their homes more comfortable and healthy.

Oregonians could use some help navigating hundreds of different incentives and cash rebates for housing upgrades like energy-efficient heat pumps, better insulation, and sturdier doors and windows.
