- Increased Administrative Work for Law Enforcement: Agencies must process individual records requests that were previously unnecessary, diverting staff from other duties.
- Higher Costs for Public Defenders and the State: Investigators working under indigent defense contracts often need booking photos to conduct effective investigations. The additional fees and processing time add to the already strained public defense budget.
- Delays in Investigations and Case Resolutions: Waiting for records requests to be processed can slow down investigations, delaying court proceedings and increasing overall case costs.

Personally, I have encountered significant delays and fees when requesting booking photos through public records channels. These barriers impede due process and create inefficiencies that are avoidable. Restoring direct access to booking photos for licensed investigators would not only improve the speed and accuracy of our work but also reduce unnecessary expenditures of taxpayer dollars.
