## RE: Child and Adult Care Food Program (HB 3201)

Chair Hartman, Vice Chairs Nguyen and Scharf, and members of the committee,

In 2025, providers, families, and advocates from across Oregon call on the Legislature to choose children. Proactive investments in early childhood services can break cycles of poverty and ensure long-term stability for children and families across the state. When we choose children, we improve people's lives and bend the cost curve on spending driven by crises. Prioritizing children builds a more just and promising future for Oregon.

Investing in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a key way to **support children.** This federal nutrition program provides essential reimbursement for nutritious meals and snacks served to eligible children in child care. CACFP is proven to promote healthy nutrition, enhance the quality of child care, stabilize the income and services of child care providers, and support local farmers and food processors.

Access to nutritious food is crucial for early childhood development. Unfortunately, as many as 1 in 6 children are food insecure, with children of color experiencing food insecurity at 2-3 times higher rates. The current federal reimbursement rate is not keeping pace with the rising cost of food, forcing providers to either pay out of pocket or pass the costs onto families.

HB 3201 seeks to address these issues by:

- Adding 10 cents reimbursement to eligible meals and snacks.
- Bringing Tier 2 home-based providers up to the same reimbursement level as Tier 1 providers. Currently, home-based providers receive different reimbursement rates depending on their location, despite the uniform cost of food.

- Providing one-time funds of \$250,000 to Oregon State University to create culturally specific menus based on USDA guidelines.
- Maintaining the \$660,000 allocated during the 2024 session to provide supplemental administrative funding for home based sponsoring organizations to help ensure statewide coverage- enhancing supports for home based providers (SB 5515).

When children are centered in decision-making and programs are intentionally designed to meet the needs of those with the most barriers to opportunity, early childhood investments have the power to improve outcomes for all children. We urge your support for HB 3201 to ensure our children receive the nutritious food they need, support childcare providers, and help local economies thrive.
