Chair Frederick, Vice-Chair Weber, and members of the committee.

My name is Cindi Gray from Bandon and I am writing to urge you to support <u>Senate Bill 1098</u>, which will prohibit discrimination based on the race, religion, ability, country of origin, sexuality, or gender of the individuals featured in the content of educational and library materials in K-12 public schools in Oregon.

As a young teen, I scoured Our Bodies Ourselves a book about health and sexuality by the Boston women's health collective. There was no education out there for me about what my body was doing as it was changing, what reproductive health looked like, even how to get and not get pregnant. When you educate people, they're stronger and they're better citizens.

This bill creates a statewide standard ensuring freedom of information both to users of that information, as well as providers of that information, for example librarians and educators. It also ensures students have access to accurate and representative information about their histories, communities and selves.
