Dear legislators,

On behalf of the 36 undersigned concerned scientists, ocean users, community leaders, and conservationists in Oregon, we write to ask you to better protect Oregon's amazing nearshore ecosystems by supporting additional investments in the management of these areas by passing House Bill 3587.

The rocky habitat areas that line Oregon's coast, such as iconic Haystack Rock and Coquille Point, are vital ecosystems that provide essential habitat for a diverse array of marine life, including fish, sea stars, anemones, nesting seabirds, marine mammals and other creatures that rely on these areas for shelter, breeding, and foraging. In addition to biodiversity, rocky habitats support recreational and commercial fisheries, a multi-billion dollar tourism industry and serve as natural buffers against coastal erosion.

Oregon's <u>updated Rocky Habitat Management Strategy</u> was established to safeguard these important ecosystems, promote biodiversity, and provide areas where scientific research and monitoring can be conducted. The Strategy was recently updated as environmental stressors including marine heat waves and human use on the coast are increasing and putting these habitats at risk. This initiative has already proven to be a vital tool in achieving these goals, as we have over 20 existing sites and eight newly designated ones lining our coast.

With the Rocky Habitat Management Strategy, Oregon can balance protection and responsible use of our iconic coastal rocky habitats. However, <u>current agency and community capacity is insufficient to fully implement the Strategy</u>, which is why we're seeking further investment of \$300,000 for the facilitation of a grant program to support site stewardship as well as additional support for a permanent Rocky Habitat Coordinator at the Department of Land Conservation and Development to coordinate management of these sites. The small grants program would provide needed resources to local communities ability to enjoy, visit and responsibly steward these areas and engage in the management and conservation of rocky habitats. <u>House Bill 3587</u> ensures the rocky habitats will endure and be accessible to all Oregonians now and for future generations.
