RE: Salem Chamber Written Testimony in Opposition of HB 3362

Dear Chair Gorsek, Chair McLain, Vice-Chair Starr, Vice-Chair Boshart Davis, and Members of the Joint Committee on Transportation,

Our organization represents over one thousand (1,000+) local businesses and fortyfive thousand (45,000) employees in the Salem area. The breadth and diversity of industries represented by our membership demonstrate an intersection of the small businesses that collectively create our state economy. The Salem Chamber supports a healthy business climate, including rail transit and a healthy environment, which combined contribute to the success of our state government and economy.

HB 3362 seeks to enact a 4% tax on the retail sales price that may be rounded up to the nearest whole cent. The unintended consequences will likely result in increased danger on our roads and diminished employment opportunities.

By placing a 4% tax on tire sales, this will incentivize consumers to wait longer in between tire purchases placing other motorists and pedestrians in jeopardy and burdens Oregon's most vulnerable, our low-income citizens and seniors on a fixed budget. Well maintained tires are an essential safety component for vehicle maintenance. Any additional cost-prohibitive measure would result in costly delays in tire replacement, creating more negligence on our roads and highways. Our weather requires regular tire replacement and maintenance to ensure safe travel.

This will also result in diminished employment opportunities. When taxes and fees are increased, business expansion, hiring, and capital investment are decreased. Small business owners who already operate on razor-thin margins closely watch their costs to create jobs and provide their services and products. Our construction, agriculture, contractors, trades, couriers, and car service industries will either adjust to this tax by increasing their price to consumers or by reducing employment opportunities. Tires are already subject to the federal excise tax, placing more taxes on small businesses will reduce state revenue as businesses retract expansion plans and freeze job growth.

We urge alternate funding sources for rail transit, pollution, and wildlife passage infrastructure. Oregon small businesses are tired of treading on thin profit margins made more challenging by the rough terrain of new taxes and fees.
