- Opening and expanding clinics and pharmacies in Sweet Home, Lincoln City and at OSU to serve students, faculty, and the community.
- Creating a medication assistance program to provide free generic and brand-name drug access for those who cannot afford medication.
- Funding pharmacists and technicians in our Cancer Center and Rheumatology department for improved access and monitoring.
- Placing pharmacists and residents in outreach clinics for chronic disease management.

Covered entity:

- All five Samaritan hospitals qualify (Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon, Lincoln City and Newport).
- High volume of low-income patients and serving remote and rural areas of Oregon.

How a patient qualifies:

- The hospital covered entity has an established relationship with the patient.
- Patient encounter occurs at an eligible child site or department of the covered entity as an outpatient with an employed or contracted provider.



- A qualified outpatient receives the drugs or prescriptions written at a child site or a department of a covered entity.
- Prescriptions are filled at a Samaritan retail or contracted pharmacy.

340B program savings:

- No taxpayer dollars are used to fund 340B.
- Invested into medication access, providing comprehensive services to more patients.
- Program is continuously audited for compliance.
