Paul Jeffrey Cochran was born on October 6th, 1947

Paul knew at an early age his life would be an adventure.

Paul "Jeff" Cochran attended Philomath High School during both his Junior & Senior Year. He graduated Philomath High School as a member of the Class of 1966.



Paul played baseball, football, participated in speech competitions, served as the Sergeant-At-Arms of his senior class & was in the school play his senior year.

Paul volunteered to serve his country by enlisting in the United States Army in the fall of 1966. He attended US Army Airborne School and became a paratrooper.





He earned a set of US Army Airborne Wings to wear on his uniform.

Paul's Gold Star Mother, Beverly Marguerite Durham, passed away in August 2018.

Beverly asked in her will that Paul's teenage home on College Street be gifted to the City of Philomath for the purposes of creating a Veterans Memorial Park honoring her fallen son.

- Beverly's daughter, Shane Fritz, was assigned as the executor of her estate.
- Shane came to Philomath City Hall and met with the city leaders to share her mother's wishes in February 2019.



On May 1, 2020, petals picked from the rose bushes on the lawn of the house were placed on Beverly Durham's Grave at Mt Union Cemetery





As per one of Beverly's last wishes, the home was removed & a Veteran Park was constructed over the next five years to honor her fallen son.





Civic groups, church congregations, Oregon State ROTC cadets, a scout troop, local businesses, city officials, city employees, city advisory boards, area veterans, and countless volunteers all worked together to build the park. Oregon Parks and Recreation Department awarded a War & Memorial Grant to help fund the memorial.

Paul's Gold Star Sister, Shane, cut the ribbon on the new park on November 9, 2024.

Paul J Cochran's name appears on one of the granite columns at the new Oregon Vietnam Veterans Memorial dedicated on November 22, 2024. It is located on the capitol grounds at the corner of State & College Streets.





Specialist David Styles was Paul's classmate in the Philomath High School Class of 1966. He was drafted into the US Army and served as a combat medic in South Vietnam. He was killed in action in an enemy ambush on March 29, 1969. Their class pictures appear together in the hallway at Philomath High School Now their names are memorialized together forever here in Salem outside the capitol. Paul J Cochran's Name appears on the Vietnam Wall Memorial in Washington DC....



...alongside over 58,000 names of people who made the ultimate sacrifice during the Vietnam War. 710 of these names are Oregonians who represent 176 different Oregon communities. We must never forget those who served, those we lost, nor their Gold Star Families.
