Re: Support For HB 3145

Chair Marsh, Vice-Chairs Anderson and Breese-Iverson, and Members of the Committee:

I am writing on behalf of Bend-Redmond Habitat for Humanity to urge your support for HB 3145 which will provide essential funding and support for factory-built housing as a critical strategy to expand affordable housing opportunities in Oregon.

At Bend-Redmond Habitat for Humanity, we are designing our Bear Creek Village development, a first-of-its-kind affordable homeownership community in Northeast Bend. For the first time, we are integrating factory-built construction methods into our building process, making this project a direct example of the type of innovative housing solutions that HB 3145 is designed to support.

Bear Creek Village is an upcoming community featuring eight energy-efficient homes designed with factory-built Structural Insulated Panels (SIPs) and Passive House (Phius) certification. This project was created in response to the urgent need for more affordable, climate-resilient homeownership opportunities in Central Oregon.

HB 3145 establishes a new set-aside of funding specifically for factory-built housing, recognizing that off-site construction is a key tool in addressing affordability and construction challenges statewide.

- 1. Speeding Up Construction & Increasing Efficiency
 - Factory-built homes reduce on-site build time, minimize weather delays, and improve overall efficiency, helping us deliver homes to families faster.
 - HB 3145 funding could allow us to scale up our efforts, demonstrating that factorybuilt homes can be a mainstream solution for affordable housing.
- 2. Making Homebuilding More Accessible for Volunteers
 - Habitat for Humanity relies on volunteer labor, but traditional construction can be physically demanding and require specialized skills.
 - Factory-built homes arrive on-site pre-cut and ready to assemble, making it easier for volunteers to contribute to the construction process and ensuring that more community members can engage in building homes for their neighbors.
- 3. Creating Energy-Efficient, Climate-Resilient Homes
 - Bear Creek Village will feature airtight homes with advanced insulation and air filtration, protecting homeowners from wildfire smoke and extreme weather conditions.

 HB 3145 prioritizes sustainable, Oregon-based materials, which aligns with our commitment to building homes that are durable, cost-effective, and environmentally responsible.

By passing HB 3145, the Legislature will enable more nonprofit and community-based developers to explore factory-built housing as a scalable, efficient, and cost-effective solution. This bill will not only help fund homes but will help prove a model that could be replicated across the state. Bend-Redmond Habitat is ready to demonstrate that factory-built homes can make construction faster, more efficient, and more accessible to volunteers, all while delivering high-quality, energy-efficient homes that families can afford.

We urge you to support HB 3145 so that more innovative housing projects like Bear Creek Village can move forward, creating a pathway to housing stability for Oregon families.
