OPPOSITION TO HB2548

My name is Craig Hopkins and I am writing this letter to state my **OPPOSIITON TO HB 2548**. I have been employed as a general nursery worker through high school and college and for the past 40 years have been a division manager. Our company raises shrubs and plants in the nursery and farm industry. I strongly **OPPOSE HB 2548** as this negatively affects my business and all the employees that we care about.

Nurserymen and farmers do not set the price for their commodities, so there is no way to recover the increased cost passed by the new governing Board, but yet, Oregon has one of the highest labors costs in the country!

Our company holds ourselves to high standards when it comes to the health and safety of our employees. Farm workers are currently protected by very strong workplace regulations such as paid sick time and minimum wage. Oregon OSHA has one of the highest worksite inspection rates and has adopted some of the most expansive protections in the country.

HB 2548 gives unelected bureaucrats the power to set wages and safety rules that go far beyond current protection, adding more regulatory and cost burden to farms. There is no accountability for the decision they make, even if their decisions ultimately close farms or result in layoffs. This could affect me personally and all those employees that I work with on a daily basis....including our families.

I am also opposing this bill because it eliminates at-will employment for farms and ranches. HB 2548 carves out farms and puts us at risk for costly claims for making necessary staffing decisions. All other private sectors in Oregon enjoy at-will status, but farms – whose employment needs are impacted by weather, yields, trade and market conditions, pests and diseases – would not. This is unfair.

We have already been affected by the overtime bill that has forced us to reduce worker hours, change crops and automate to control labor costs associated with overtime. HB 2548 would have more severe consequences.

This bill does not help workers or consumers; it just makes farming harder and more expensive. <u>I urge</u> you to vote no on HB 2548 to protect Oregon farms and ranches and the jobs we currently provide.
