Dear Chair Neron, Vice-Chairs Dobson and McIntire, and members of the Committee:

My name is Chrystell Reed, and I serve as the Executive Director of Ridgeline Montessori Public Charter School in Eugene, Oregon. I write today to urge your support for **House Bill 3444**, which seeks to correct the long-standing inequities in Oregon's public charter school funding model.

Oregon's public charter schools play a vital role in the state's public education system, offering innovative, student-centered learning environments that families actively choose to best support their children's unique educational needs. At Ridgeline Montessori, we provide a high-quality, public Montessori education to a diverse student body. Despite persistent funding challenges, our students consistently outperform district averages on state assessments while also reporting a strong sense of belonging and community. This success is a direct result of the commitment and innovative approaches public charter schools bring to education.

Charter schools like Ridgeline provide **proven alternative models**, including Montessori, Waldorf, language immersion, and project-based learning. These models foster **deep community engagement**, **high family involvement**, **and a shared sense of responsibility for student success**. At Ridgeline, our families and staff actively contribute to creating an enriching educational environment that allows students to thrive. However, sustaining these high-quality programs requires **equitable funding**.

The Problem: Charter Schools Are Unfairly Underfunded

Oregon's current school funding structure **shortchanges public charter school students**. Unlike district-run public schools, charter schools receive **only 80%** of the per-student **State School Fund (SSF) allocation**. Moreover, they are often **excluded from numerous other funding streams** that districts can access. According to a recent **ECONorthwest report**, Oregon's public charter schools receive **less than half** the total per-student funding that district-run schools receive.

This growing **funding gap** is **unsustainable**. Over the past decade, charter school enrollment has increased, yet funding relative to enrollment has declined. Without a **fair share** of the SSF Grant and access to local, state, and federal education dollars, this disparity will continue to widen, placing charter schools at an ever-greater disadvantage. **At 80% funding, this means that 1 out of every 5 students is not funded, yet we are still expected and committed to providing a high-quality public education.**

At Ridgeline Montessori, the funding shortfall is evident in:

- Teacher and Staff Compensation Gaps: We cannot offer salaries competitive with our sponsoring district, making staff recruitment and retention more challenging.
- Limited Support Services and Elective Offerings: Our ability to provide services and programs, enrichment activities, and electives is constrained by funding shortages.
- Facility Limitations: Unlike district-run schools, we lack adequate funding for facility improvements and maintenance, limiting the services we can offer students.
- Reliance on Fundraising for Core Programs: We must fundraise extensively to support
 programs like physical education and art, which should be fundamental components of every
 public school experience.

The Solution: HB 3444 Ensures Fair Funding for All Public School Students

HB 3444 addresses these inequities by:

- Increasing charter school SSF allocation from 80% to 95%, ensuring fairer funding for students regardless of school model.
- Granting charter school students access to the same local, state, and federal education funding that district-run schools receive.

Equitable funding is essential for maintaining and strengthening the **high-quality education** that Oregon's charter schools provide. Without fair financial support, **charter schools will continue to face unnecessary hurdles**, limiting educational opportunities for Oregon families.

All Oregon students deserve **fair funding**, regardless of whether they attend a district-run or charter school. **On behalf of our teachers, staff, and, most importantly, our students, I urge you to support HB 3444.**
