My first tangible experience with climate change was when I was 14 years old during the 2020 wildfire season. While I had heard about climate change before, I had never properly learned about it in school. So, when the skies turned orange and started raining ash while my friend's house burned to the ground, I was scared and unprepared. I didn't understand why this was happening.

After these devastating events, I was forced to learn about climate change, and how profoundly our communities are affected. Since then, I have kept advocating for climate education.
