I am writing this letter in support of HB2029. Insurance audits are abusive and unfair and limit access to care to the people of Oregon. It also prevents therapists like me from wanting to go into their own private practice, because insurance companies are allowed to change requirements for notes and then go back years, to retroactively deny notes and treatments that they previously approved, and demand hundreds of thousands of dollars back.
