There is a guagmire of paperwork for every incident. You have good hearted trained people working with kids that are trying to do their best to help them and they put themselves and their reputations on the line everyday to do so and usually are the lowest paid positions. Restraints need to be used immediately to protect both parties involved. Remove acting out kids from classrooms instead of removing the class. Seclusion's description is the problem. Letting the child have space to themselves while still in plain view is a necessary tool and some kids thought it helped them calm down. In public school and treatment facilities the other kids suffer due to the disruption by a few. I would challenge anyone at the legislator to spend a day working in one of these facilities hands on to see what they are really like, you try to handle an out of control kid with all these rules you have put in place. They can seriously injure you but if natural consequences get them hurt its a huge problem and even more paperwork. Too much time is taken away from treatment because of incidence reports and daily notes. There needs to be change, yes, but balanced. Legislators should be talking to the people working in the trenches for ideas, not the talking heads trying to get money for their programs. Then maybe you can fix the rules so both sides can be safe.
