Measure, Appointment or Topic: HB3075

I appreciate this opportunity to submit testimony to the appointed and elected members in public service and wish to express my gratitude towards them.

I am firmly opposed to HB3075. It is a bill that is not based in science or honest statistics. Respectfully,

the sponsors of this bill have been deceived by the fearmongering of groups of individuals that are set on perpetuating emotional ideologies not based in fact.

Gun violence is a problem. Nearly all gun violence is committed by individuals with handguns. The amount of crime and violence committed by individuals with long guns is statistically insignificant when compared to handguns. Why does this bill restrict long guns? Why is this bill not focused on the regulation of handguns?

If the authors of this bill were truly concerned with saving human lives, they would focus on regulating handguns, but they go well beyond that. So what are their motives?
