Measure, Appointment or Topic: HB3075

Dear Members of Oregon Legislature,

I am writing today to voice my strong opposition to House Bill 3075, which directs the Department of Justice to study the establishment of a state gun dealer licensing program. This bill is yet another attempt to chip away at our Second Amendment rights, under the guise of "studying" gun sales. However, we know exactly where these leads—more government regulation, more barriers to legal gun ownership, and an eventual push toward restrictive policies that make it harder for law-abiding citizens to exercise their constitutional rights.

The intent behind this bill is clear: to create a state-controlled gun dealer licensing system that would allow future legislators to limit, restrict, and regulate firearm sales beyond what is already federally required. This is not about safety; this is about control. The federal government already has extensive regulations on gun dealers, including background checks, ATF licensing requirements, and strict compliance laws. Adding another layer of state bureaucracy is redundant, unnecessary, and unconstitutional overreach.

Like many recent gun control measures, HB 3075 targets responsible gun owners and dealers while doing nothing to stop criminals. Oregon has already seen the passage of Measure 114, a deeply flawed and unconstitutional law that imposed magazine bans and permit-to-purchase requirements, restricting the rights of law-abiding citizens while criminals continue to ignore the law.

By adding unnecessary licensing requirements, HB 3075 could force small, family-run firearm dealers out of business, leaving Oregonians with fewer options to legally purchase firearms. This does nothing to reduce crime—it only makes it harder for responsible citizens to protect themselves and their families. In addition, there is no fiscal impact statement included. However, after speaking with several policing departments it is clear there is no funding and not enough staffing to implement any of these changes. Which further infringes on the right to purchase and bear arms. Not only will that infringe on rights but will force small business owners to close their door due to lack of sales. With more business closures ultimately continue to effect the state even further.

The Second Amendment clearly states that the right to keep and bear arms "shall not be infringed." Yet, time and time again, we see efforts like HB 3075 attempting to erode that right through excessive regulations and bureaucratic red tape. The government should not have the power to decide who can and cannot sell firearms beyond the already rigorous federal standards in place.

Conclusion: Stand Against HB 3075

I urge you to reject HB 3075 and any future legislation that seeks to undermine our

Second Amendment rights. Instead of targeting responsible gun owners and businesses, lawmakers should focus on enforcing existing laws, addressing mental health issues, and cracking down on criminals who obtain guns illegally. HB 3075 is a slippery slope toward more restrictions, more control, and fewer rights for Oregonians. Do not let this bill pass. Stand up for our freedoms, our Constitution, and the right of every Oregonian to protect themselves and their families.
