Ensuring their safety is paramount, as it directly impacts the quality and continuity of care they can offer. By directing the Oregon Health Authority to study the safety of these professionals and report findings to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health by September 15, 2026, HB 2203 takes a crucial step toward identifying and addressing potential risks faced by these workers.

This initiative aligns with our commitment to dismantling sexism, racism, and structural oppression through the movement of resources and ideas toward gender justice. Many behavioral health workers are women who often encounter unique challenges in their professional environments.
