Chair Frederick, Vice-Chair Weber, and Members of the Committee:

As a mom of an adult with intellectual disability (ID) who successfully completed a four-year postsecondary education (PSE) program – the Georgia Tech Excel program – in May 2023 and who currently works in a full-time job, as a former Associate Dean of the business school at the University of San Francisco, as a current member of the Oregon Council for Developmental Disabilities (OCDD), and as the President and CEO of Relay Resources, the largest disability-inclusive social enterprise nonprofit in the state of Oregon with more than 850 employees and with over \$60 million in revenue, I am testifying in full support of Oregon State Senate Bill 977.

Every state in the country now has at least one postsecondary college program for students with ID. In Oregon, we have ONE program - the Career and Community Studies (CCS) program at Portland State University. This academic year, due to budget cuts, the CCS program was not able to admit a cohort of students.

If funding for the CCS program stays flat, the program could cease to exist, and Oregon will become the ONLY state in the country WITHOUT a PSE college program for students with ID.

For comparison to states with similar populations to Oregon:

- South Carolina, Population: 5.4 million, PSE programs: 6
- ✓ Alabama, Population: 5.1 million, PSE programs: 7
- ✓ Louisiana, Population: 4.7 million, PSE programs: 10
- Kentucky, Population: 4.6 million, PSE programs: 6
- Oregon, Population: 4.3 million, PSE programs: 1
- ✓ Oklahoma, Population: 4.1 million, PSE programs: 3
- ✓ Connecticut, Population: 3.6 million, PSE programs: 4
- ✓ Iowa, Population: 3.2 million, PSE programs: 6
- ✓ Utah, Population: 3.5 million, PSE programs: 3

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Studies have shown that adults with ID have an employment rate of over 80%. With just one year of PSE, the unemployment rate drops to 50%. If a student with ID completes a four-year PSE program, the unemployment rate drops to under 20%.

If we value people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, let's fund CCS and expand PSE programs in community colleges in Oregon through SB977!
