

Provider Requirements for Behavioral Health Services Delivered Outside Oregon

Questions and answers for coordinated care organizations (CCOs)

This document explains Oregon Health Authority (OHA) requirements for out-of-state outpatient and residential behavioral health providers serving CCO members. The requirements are the same whether the provider has a contract with the CCO or a single-case agreement to serve only a specific CCO member.

Definitions

OHA defines behavioral health providers as:

- Programs, facilities, and Individual practitioners providing direct care defined in Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 430.010,
- Treatment facilities defined in ORS 430.306,
- Organizational providers defined in ORS 430.637 and
- Providers defined in Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) division 309-008.

A CCO-contracted provider is the same as a Participating Provider as defined in OAR 410-141-3500.

A provider with a single case agreement is the same as a Non-Participating Provider as defined in OAR 410-141-3500.

Provider enrollment and contracting

Do providers need to be enrolled in OHA's Medicaid Management Information System (MMIS)?

According to OAR <u>410-120-1180(2)</u>, out-of-state providers must enroll through <u>Provider Enrollment Unit</u> The unit will enroll approved providers in MMIS.

To serve CCO members, providers must enroll and contract with the CCO responsible for the member's behavioral health coverage.

- The member's Plan Type indicates the services the CCO is responsible for. OAR <u>410-141-3500</u>(68) lists these Plan Types.
- The CCO contact information page identifies each CCO and contact methods.

The CCO will work with OHA to enroll providers in MMIS as "encounter only" providers.

Can CCOs contract with out-of-state behavioral health providers?

Yes. The CCO is responsible for provider contracting and credentialling as described in the CCO contract and OAR 410-141-3510.

Licensing and certification

Do providers have to be licensed or certified in the state they are located in?

Yes. OAR <u>410-120-1180(1)</u> requires that provider organizations outside Oregon be licensed and certified by the proper agencies in their state of residence.

All individual practitioners providing in-person services must be licensed by the appropriate Oregon licensing board for in-person services:

- Board of Social Workers;
- Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists;
- Oregon Board of Psychology; and
- Oregon Mental Health Regulatory Agency.

This is true whether the individual practitioner serves members through an organization provider as defined in ORS 430.637(1)(b), or through independent practice.

Residential facilities for children must also be licensed by the Oregon Department of Human Services (ODHS) as a child-caring agency and by OHA as a psychiatric residential treatment facility (PRTF) when:

- The child is in the custody of ODHS Child Welfare (ORS 418.321), or
- The facility's state does not certify, license or enroll PRTF providers as required by <u>42 CFR</u> Part 441 Subpart D.

How do providers obtain a license or certification in Oregon?

OHA's <u>Licensing and Certification website</u> provides information on how residential and outpatient behavioral health providers can obtain a license or certification depending on their provider type.

ODHS's <u>Children's Care Licensing Program page</u> provides child-caring agency licensing requirements, forms and instructions.

Conditions for maintaining enrollment, licensing or certification

All providers must document services and maintain documentation consistent with OARs <u>410-120-1360</u> and <u>410-172-0620</u>.

According to ORS <u>443.421</u>, residential treatment facilities must operate according to ORS 443.002 or 443.400 to 443.455 or the rules of the licensing agency to maintain ODHS and/or OHA licensure.

Outpatient provider organizations must comply with requirements of their respective Oregon licensing boards:

- Board of Social Workers;
- Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists;
- Oregon Board of Psychology; and
- Oregon Mental Health Regulatory Agency.
