Opposition Testimony to Oregon House Bill 3076 (2025)

Chair and Members of the Committee.

I am testifying in opposition to House Bill 3076. This bill directs the Department of Justice to study the creation of a state gun dealer licensing program. While it may seem like a harmless study, it is clearly the beginning of more government overreach, unnecessary regulation, and additional costs to taxpayers.

redundant, wasteful programs.

5. A Slippery Slope to More Restrictions: Once the framework for a state gun dealer licensing program is in place, it will only be a matter of time before even more restrictions are proposed. This bill is a first step in a larger plan to erode Second Amendment rights in Oregon. Instead of expanding government control over our lives, we need a government that is focused on protecting our rights and making thoughtful decisions, not pushing for new regulations that limit our freedoms. Conclusion: House Bill 3076 is just another unnecessary step toward overregulation, and it is not in the best interest of Oregon's citizens. Oregonians want government to work efficiently, not create more problems for them to navigate. If you continue to push for unnecessary laws that create more bureaucracy and regulation, you will only alienate voters and undermine trust in government. I strongly urge you to reject this bill and instead focus on making Oregon's government more efficient and effective for the people.
