Re: OMA Comments on HB 3234

The Oregon Medical Association (OMA) represents and advocates for more than 7,000 physicians, physician associates, medical and PA students across Oregon. Our mission is to support our members in their efforts to practice medicine effectively, improve the health of Oregonians, and provide the highest quality patient care.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide testimony in support of the concepts in the -4 amendment to House Bill 3234. The OMA supports a stronger focus on not allowing corporate interests to trump physician interests in the delivery of medical care to Oregonians.

Generally, when bad actors in the health care space engage in conduct that leads to increased health care costs, reduced access to care, and poorer quality of care, we view that as anticompetitive conduct that our Oregon Department of Justice should take a closer look at. The -4 amendment could be simplified to allow DOJ to do just that.

We also would like to see confidentiality protections for information that a clinician has that they believe in good faith is detrimental to patient care so they may be able to bring that information forward for the DOJ's consideration.

For these reasons the OMA is in support of concepts in the -4 amendment to HB 3234.
