My name is Joshua Carlton Hull, a hardworking father , husband, son , and proud member of our community and I'm standing here today with a heavy heart, asking you to hear me—not just as a citizen, but as someone who feels the weight of this bill, HB 3076, pressing down on the very freedoms that make us who we are. It just punishes the ones who follow the rules, while the real threats slip through the cracks. I've seen the numbers—most guns at crime scenes don't come from these dealers. So why are we suffocating them? Why are we making it harder for people like me, who just want to exercise a right that's ours, not a privilege to be chipped away?

Please, think about the people behind this—parents, veterans, small business owners. We're not the enemy. We're your constituents, and we're begging you to see that HB 3076 doesn't make us safer—it makes us smaller. It takes away a piece of who we are, and I can't bear to watch that happen. I'm asking you, from the bottom of my heart, to vote no. Let us keep our rights, our businesses, our Oregon.
