My name is Katie Quick, and I am a proud alumna of Portland State University and serve as the volunteer chair of the PSU Advocates. I appreciate the opportunity to testify in strong support of increasing the Public University Support Fund (PUSF) by \$275 million in the 2025-27 biennium for a total of \$1.275 billion.
