

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to express my strong support for **HB 3134**, which seeks to reform the prior authorization process for therapy services in Oregon. As a dedicated physical therapist, I have witnessed firsthand how current prior authorization requirements delay essential care, impose unnecessary administrative burdens, and negatively impact patient outcomes.

I am Kana Arreguin, PT, DPT, CLT-LANA, and I practice at Wildwood Physical Therapy in Portland, Oregon. Our clinic specializes in breast cancer rehabilitation, lymphedema treatment, and pelvic floor therapy, serving approximately 60 patients per week between two physical therapists. Many of our patients require timely interventions to manage complex medical conditions, yet prior authorization requirements frequently disrupt their care.

One of my patients, a homebound individual with **severe scrotal lymphedema**, experienced a significant setback due to prior authorization barriers. He was covered by a **Regence Medicare Advantage plan** that required prior authorization for his therapy. Despite making progress—albeit slow due to the severity of his condition—his visits were denied because he was not improving **"fast enough."** The abrupt discontinuation of care led to **a decline in his condition**, forcing him to wait until we could reapply for visits after a mandatory waiting period. This delay was entirely avoidable and detrimental to his health.

Beyond harming patients, prior authorization also places a heavy burden on providers. At our clinic, each physical therapist spends approximately two hours per week on prior authorization requests, diverting valuable time away from direct patient care. Peer-to-peer reviews often result in approvals anyway, raising the question of why these hurdles exist in the first place. Additionally, we frequently encounter inconsistent decisions, redundant documentation requests, and long approval wait times—all of which further delay necessary treatment.

The passage of **HB 3134** would ensure that patients receive the timely, medically necessary care they need while reducing unnecessary administrative strain on providers. Prior authorization should serve as a safeguard, not a barrier. I urge you to support this crucial legislation to improve healthcare access and efficiency in Oregon.
