As a former Personal Support Worker for four years, I have firsthand experience in understanding the vital role that support systems play for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The critical services provided by support workers help ensure these individuals live with dignity and independence.

During my time working as a Personal Support Worker, I witnessed how essential these services are. The individual I supported depended on their caregivers for more than just physical assistance—they required compassionate, skilled, and reliable support to navigate their daily lives. However, the reality is that many support workers are underpaid and overburdened, making it difficult to retain skilled professionals in this field. This issue is especially troubling because when workers are not compensated with a livable wage, the quality of care can suffer, and the individuals who rely on these services are the ones who ultimately bear the consequences.

By passing this bill, we are not only ensuring that support workers are compensated fairly, but we are also making a long-term investment in the well-being of those with intellectual and developmental disabilities in Oregon. This bill helps both parties—support workers and the individuals they care for—by strengthening the foundation of care and support systems in our state.
