In the rush to remove what many consider an "electronic nuisance", it is, in my opinion, CRITICAL to point out, that to remove these devices is not only a violation of one's Right to be secure in their person, but, if implemented, a means of bullying students into a compliant echo chamber disguised as a "classroom".

1. There are far too many instances of teachers abusing students verbally, physically, sexually, and academically (punishing students for 'wrong think'). If the past decade has demonstrated anything, it's that the school and its administrators will go to extraordinary lengths to cover up abuse. St. Helens Oregon is an EXCELLENT example of a coordinated cover up at a school.

2. The ability to record lectures for home study only enhances one's ability to perform well

3. The ability to have a device that's capable of recording abuse for the purpose of future investigation is necessary.
