I am writing to express my strong opposition to Senate Bill 210, which proposes limiting Oregon's vote-by-mail system and mandating in-person voting on Election Day. As a concerned Oregon voter, I believe that this bill would severely undermine the accessibility, efficiency, and security of our elections.

Oregon has long been a leader in secure, accessible elections through its vote-by-mail system, which has consistently led to high voter participation rates and minimal fraud. The existing system has served Oregonians well for over two decades, providing both security and convenience.

I urge you to reject SB 210 and uphold Oregon's strong tradition of accessible and fair elections. Instead of restricting voting options, the Legislature should focus on policies that expand voter participation and strengthen the security of our well-established vote-by-mail process.
