I strongly oppose Oregon Bill SB210, which seeks to make in-person voting the norm for Oregon elections. This bill undermines the very principles of accessibility and inclusivity that are fundamental to a thriving democracy.

For these reasons, I urge you to reject SB210 and preserve the accessibility and convenience of mail-in voting, which has proven to be an effective and equitable way for Oregonians to exercise their right to vote.
