My name is Gary Van Zandt and I'm writing today in strong opposition to Oregon SB 210. Furthermore, Oregon's vote-by-mail process is secure and transparent. Every ballot is tracked, verified, and counted with rigorourous safeguards in place.

Eliminating voting by mail amounts to large scale voter suppression which is anti-Democratic. Only sore losers want to suppress the vote.

Voting is one of the most important rights we have as citizens. Oregon's vote-by-mail system honors that right by making voting convenient and accessible to all eligible voters. Making in-person voting the standard, as proposed by this unnecessary bill, would be a huge step backward that would impose harmful burdens on this crucial right and depress voter turnout.

The mail-in system gives all Oregon voters ample opportunity to exercise their right. This includes the elderly. It includes the disabled. It includes those with inflexible work schedules for whom in-person voting is difficult. It includes those living in counties with an insufficient number of in-person voting locations, resulting in lengthy waits. Mail-in voting is not impacted by adverse weather conditions that impact inperson voting. It's not impacted by intimidation tactics that can be employed at inperson voting locations. Mail-in voting is not merely adequate - it is superior to inperson voting. It's something Oregon can take pride in. This bill threatens our sacred right to vote.
