With mail-in voting, there is no way to verify whether a voter was pressured or influenced when filling out their ballot.

Finally, the widespread use of mail-in ballots increases logistical challenges and costs. Election offices must handle a significant influx of mailed ballots, requiring additional resources for processing, verification, and security. These added complexities create a burden on the election system and taxpayers.
