The efficiency and security of Oregon's vote-by-mail system have been a model for other states, demonstrating that a well-managed mail system can securely handle electoral processes without the complications that often accompany large-scale in-person voting.

In conclusion, SB 210 represents a step backward in our ongoing efforts to make voting as accessible and inclusive as possible. I urge the committee to consider the adverse impacts this bill could have on voter turnout and equity, and to reject this proposal in favor of upholding Oregon's commendable vote-by-mail system.
