Measure, Appointment or Topic: SB210

I am opposed to SB 210 being considered for the Oregon voting system. Voting by mail is an economical, efficient, and accessible system that's worked and provided Oregon voters with the convenience of carrying out this tradition from home. Households can share the importance of voting with children who can learn the importance of taking part in an election by witnessing parents filling out ballots, researching candidates, and talking about learning points of candidates.
