To The Senate Committee On Rules,

I strongly oppose SB210, which seeks to remove vote-by-mail as the standard voting method in Oregon. Mail-in voting is an outstanding standard voting option that encourages widespread participation in democracy while also allowing the voter ample time to sit down at their kitchen table with the voter's pamphlet and go through each item at their own pace before deciding how to mark their ballot.

Mail-in voting also removes barriers to voter participation including work hours and transportation to a polling place; and with mail-in voting as the standard voting option, those with physical mobility issues are not put upon to prove their need for special mail-in privileges in order to receive the mail-in voting option.

According to research detailed in the NPR article attached below: "Let's put the vote-by-mail 'fraud' myth to rest.

"Over the past 20 years, more than 250 million ballots have been cast by mail nationwide, while there have been just 143 criminal convictions for election fraud related to mail ballots. That averages out to about one case per state every six or seven years, or a fraud rate of 0.00006%.

"While election experts say fraud in mail balloting is slightly more common than in inperson voting, it's still such a minuscule amount it's not statistically meaningful."
